


# Queensgate Primary School Home Learning

The children will have already been taught the sounds and numbers below so this is an opportunity for them to consolidate and apply their learning. However they have a new tricky word to learn 'he'. ## Sounds of the week E e (egg) U u (umbrella)





To complete the /e/n and /u/ sounds, this week, Can your child spot any of these sounds in books or print? Where does the 'e' or 'u' grapheme appear in a word? Can your child use these sounds in blending and segmenting activities? Have a go at writing these sounds. The rhyme for 'e' is 'lift off the top and scoop out the egg' and 'u' is 'down and under, up to the top and draw the puddle'.

Can your child identify this number? What can they tell you about eight? Can they find this number in the environment? What happens when we add or subtract eight to/from a number? What if you had 10 objects for example, and took 8 away?
